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**ULUBORLU MUSEUM**  
 FROM THE TRACE OF THE PAST INTO THE  
 FUTURE



It was opened on 23 June 2007 on the ground floor, the first floor of the palace of culture, as part of the Isparta museum. There are closed exhibition halls on two floors of the building with an area of 108 square meters and an open exhibition area in the garden, which is located to the west of the building. Copper and iron products have been known for their hardness and sharpness in Uluborlu for about 200 years. Door locks without keys and harnesses are on display in the ironworking showcase alongside many copper and iron items. A round tray, a plate, a bucket, a cup made of tinned copper, spoons made of horn, a brass tea samovar heated by charcoal, bathing items, copper vessel for heating water, bath bowls, the towels woven in the looms in the houses are exhibited in the showcase of kitchen-bath and ablution culture. A set consisting of brocaded bride gown, purple velvet embroidered with silver thread, vest, pantalets (shalwar) and forehead jewelry, neckbands, hair veils, filigree, belt buckles with silver embroidery are exhibited in the section where objects and items used by the women are exhibited.

Weapons from the 19th century, measurement tools for weight and length, lighting objects, vests, belts, shalwars and woolen socks, amber rosaries and cigarette holders, chained pocket watches, money purses, rifles, water bottles, the swords called yataghan with a sharp blade and daggers are exhibited in the display section (shop) where the articles used by the men are exhibited. Spinners, wool spindles, looming combs, scissors, and knives are exhibited in looming showcase. Kitchen utensils consisting of tiled and green glazed plates, a water decanter made of Çanakkale ceramic, and porcelain dishes from the 19th century are exhibited in ceramic objects and coffee culture showcase. There are stone artefacts in the museum garden.
