


It is known that the Latifoğlu Mansion, located on Gaziosmanpaşa Boulevard in Tokat Center was built in 1746 in the Ottoman Baroque style. Latifoglu Mansion, which was built on an "L"-shaped plan with a mud brick as a filler between the wooden carcasses, features rich wood, plaster, and pencil decorations. Wooden ceiling, doors, bed cabinet and cupboard doors of the Turkish bathroom are decorated with floral motifs. The Pasha Room, with its baroque wooden ceiling core, cupboard and bed cabinet covers and gate reflects beautiful examples of wood craftsmanship. The poolside room on the second floor attracts attention with its gilded wooden ceiling belly and walls decorated with floral motifs and Istanbul depictions.



Gypsum work is seen on the plaster molded decorated cookers and skylight windows of the Pasha Room and the Poolside Room. The motif called "Mühr-ü Süleyman" (Seal of Suleyman) is used on the plastered stained glass skylight windows. In 1988, Latifoğlu Mansion, furnished with the furniture and clothing of the region and made into a lively and realistic exhibition with mannequins, was built as a part of Tokat Museum reflecting the traditional domestic culture of Tokat.
